VHI Celebrates the Distinguished Residency of Msgr Georges Lemaître with 2024 Von Hügel Lecture, Given by Director of Vatican Observatory

On Wednesday, 20 November, the Von Hügel Institute for Critical Catholic Inquiry hosted its annual Von Hügel Lecture –'Why Do We Look Up?' – given by Br Guy Consolmagno, SJ.

Br Guy is the Director of the <u>Vatican Observatory</u> and is known internationally for inspiring audiences into a deeper appreciation of the multiple, interrelated ways in which human beings are drawn to study the cosmos of which we are part. The lecture took place in front of an audience of scholars, students, and members of the general public, from Cambridge and beyond. Br Guy told stories of astronomical discovery and cosmological pioneers, particularly highlighting the legacy of Msgr Georges Lemaître, and reflecting deeply on the question of why humans continue to study the heavens.

This year, the Von Hügel Lecture celebrated the centenary of Lemaître's 1924 residency at St Edmund's House. While at St Edmund's House—now St Edmund's College—Lemaître carried out some of the foundational work that led to what later came to be known as the 'Big Bang' theory. This lecture celebrated the interplay between science and faith, and how interdisciplinary study is a key ingredient for discovery.

'Shakespeare's Virtues' Brings Together Participations from Around the World

The Michaelmas 2024 online lecture series —'Shakespeare's Virtues: Three Lectures on Living' by <u>Professor Julia</u> <u>Reinhard Lupton</u> — brought together scholars, students, and learners from across the globe, including participants from the US, UK, and Ukraine.

Across three Shakespeare plays, Professor Lupton examined the nature of virtue in the light of text, character, and performance: how in *Twelfth Night* characters conceal and reveal their true selves; how in *Romeo and Juliet* the play's two lovers aspire towards transcendent love, which both recognises and enhances human beings as divine image-bearers; and how in *King Lear*, the infamous scene of Edgar and Gloucester at the (feigned) Dover cliff is intended not as mere deception or abuse, but as a jointly constructed trust exercise and form of hospice care. VHI Affiliate <u>Dr Maria Devlin McNair</u> offered responses to Professor Lupton's lectures, with actor Ava Burton reading from the plays. Each session concluded with an open discussion and Q&A.

'Shakespeare's Virtues' is part of a larger Shakespeare initiative, 'Shakespeare and the Common Good?', set up in collaboration with <u>Shakespeare at Notre Dame</u>; an initiative that explores how Shakespeare both succeeds and fails to galvanise shared pursuits of the common good while also recognising the rich opportunities Shakespeare's plays offer us to reflect more deeply on our contemporary world and our lived experiences in it. To begin our 2024–2025 Research Seminar series, Research Associates Dr Caterina Milo and <u>Dr Thana de Campos-Rudinsky</u> co-presented on 'Miscarriage: A Hidden Loss', considering from legal and medical perspectives how love, justice, and genuine health care might be better institutionalised for those who experience loss in miscarriage.

As part of a joint collaboration entitled 'Fragility and Flourishing: the AI Initiative at the VHI', Senior Research Associate <u>Prof Maria Burke</u>, Affiliate Members <u>Dr Gianmarco Contino</u> and <u>Prof Jonathan Warner</u>, and Visiting Scholar <u>Prof Gill</u> <u>Goulding, CJ</u> organised a workshop on artificial intelligence, considering its significance, implications, and risks from theological, philosophical, economic, and medical perspectives.

In collaboration with St Edmund's Fellow <u>Dr Anna Gannon, FSA</u>, the VHI also hosted London-based iconographer <u>Dr</u> <u>Irina Bradley</u> for 'The Meaning and Making of Icons', featuring both a viewing of her icon collection and a lecture on the material and theological history of icons.
