Alumnus Dr John Jumper awarded 2024 Nobel Prize in Chemistry

Alumnus Dr John Jumper was awarded this the 2024 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, alongside fellow Cambridge alum Sir Demis Hassabis for developing an AI model to solve a 50-year-old problem: predicting proteins' complex structures.

Dr John Jumper completed an MPhil in theoretical condensed matter physics at Cambridge's famous Cavendish Laboratory in 2008, during which time he was a member of St Edmund's College, before receiving his PhD in Chemistry from the University of Chicago.

St Edmund's College Celebrates Black History Month

October 1 st 2024 marked the start of Black History Month and to celebrate, St Edmund's hosted a panel discussion on 16 October 2024 in the Garden Room, to honour the resilience, achievements and cultural contributions of St Edmund's black community and the wider black community.

Chaired by our Director of Wellbeing, Dr Nqobile Msomi, we welcomed guest speakers Godspower Major (m. 2023, *left*), <u>Dr Rafia Al-Lamki</u> (*centre*), and Ebenezer Ademisoye (m. 2005, *right*) to join us in discussing this year's Black History Month theme, 'Reclaiming Narratives' and what that means for black excellence, health and wellness.

The 2024 Von Hügel Lecture delivered by Br Guy Consolmagno, SJ: 'Why Do We Look Up? : An Astronomer's Reflection on the Universe and the Call to Study It'

On Wednesday, 20 November, the Von Hügel Institute for Critical Catholic Inquiry hosted its annual Von Hügel Lecture, featuring Br Guy Consolmagno, SJ.

Br Guy is the Director of the <u>Vatican Observatory</u> and is known internationally for inspiring audiences into a deeper appreciation of the multiple, interrelated ways in which human beings are drawn to study the cosmos of which we are part.

The lecture took place in front of an audience of scholars, students, and members of the general public, from Cambridge and beyond. Br Guy told stories of astronomical discovery and cosmological pioneers, particularly highlighting the legacy of Msgr Georges Lemaître, and reflecting deeply on the question of why humans continue to study the heavens.

This year, the Von Hügel Lecture celebrated the centenary of Lemaître's 1924 tenure at St Edmund's House. While at St Edmund's House—now St Edmund's College— Lemaître carried out some of the foundational work that led to what later came to be known as the 'Big Bang' theory. This lecture celebrated the interplay between science and faith, and how interdisciplinary study is a key ingredient for discovery. The Challenge, which is also known as the Advancing Development Goals International Contest, is a global competition that invites Master's students to propose innovative solutions to a specific and relevant international development problem. It is organised by the <u>Geneva Graduate Institute</u>.

At Cambridge, Cynthia did an MPhil in Criminological Research, and Simiso studied for an MPhil in Development Studies.

Their entry was called Project REACH, which addressed this year's theme on 'The Challenges of Youth Empowerment' by aiming to improve educational access for youth in Internally Displaced Persons' camps.

St Edmund's alumnus leads exoplanet iLocator project awarded \$4.3m in research grants

Jointly led by Ohio State and The University of Notre Dame, the iLocater team was recently awarded a pair of grants that will significantly bolster iLocater's planned scientific capabilities: a \$2.7 million award from the National Science Foundation's Major Research Instrumentation Program (MRI) as well as \$1.6 million from NASA's Astrophysics Research and Analysis (APRA) program.

Dr Jonathan Crass (m. 2010), the co-principal investigator of the iLocater program and the instrument scientist in the Imaging Science Laboratory at Ohio State, said "We want to build new instruments with new technology so we can push the boundaries of science."

Alumna Alexandra Grigore wins Gates Cambridge Impact Prize 2025

We're delighted to announce that alumna Alexandra Grigore (2012, PhD Nanotechnology) has won a highly prestigious Gates Cambridge Impact Prize 2025.

Alexandra Grigore is the Chief Strategy Officer and Co-Founder of Simprints, the world's first open-source biometric ID platform with privacy at its core.

The Gates Cambridge Scholarship was set up in 2000 following an historic donation from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Since 2001 2,156 scholars have been selected, representing 112 different countries.
